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The Catholic Education Advantage!

How are we making a difference in the live of students?

An important mission for St. Anthony of Padua Parish is Catholic Education and Formation. At St. Anthony High School, we strive to help our students achieve both academic success, and cultivate the skills for long-term success in life. These skills include instilling a love of the Catholic faith and community service, and teaching moral values and strong work habits.

We believe our students are well-prepared for their next level of education, or to tackle the workforce with a strong educational foundation. Our students are blessed to have faith in the classroom every day. In addition to our academic offerings, students also have the opportunity for technical, healthcare, and business skill training through programs such as CTEC, Health Occupations, and CEO. We are proud to partner with community programs and offer such a variety of educational opportunities for our students.

While Catholic formation is our focus, St. Anthony High School also has a long history of academic success. For our 2019 graduates, their average ACT score was 25.5, versus a national average of 20.7 and a statewide average of 24.3. The college acceptance rate was 89.3%. Of those students who matriculated to college, 31% selected a two-year college, and 63% entered a four-year college.

The top three schools of attendance for the Class of 2019 included:


- Lake Land College (10 Students)
- University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign (5 Students)
- Southern Illinois University Edwardsville (5 Students)

In fact, of the students who chose to attend Lake Land College, 40% received Lake Land's Presidential Scholarship covering two years of full tuition. In total, the cash value of scholarships accepted by 2019 graduates was over \$500,000. Additionally, these same graduates earned approximately 312 college course credit hours through dual credit courses and AP test scores, saving close to \$185,000 in college tuition.

Each year our students continue to be blessed by developing and utilizing the abundant gifts upon which they were bestowed! We are so proud of them and grateful for the opportunity to help them grow closer to God. None of this is possible without the prayers, volunteerism, and financial support from our parishioners and alumni.



Learning to Navigate Unprecedented Times

The global pandemic of COVID-19 has disrupted our lives in countless ways. Our classrooms, hallways, and MPR were all empty and dark. Our sports and spring extra-curricular activities were taken away from us. Despite all of the changes and disappointments, our commitment to education - Catholic Education - did not change. It was encouraging to see all of the students, teachers and students step up to the challenge. Even with the social distancing challenges, everyone made the best of the situation.

Remote Learning:

Effective mid-March, the State of Illinois suspended in-person education. Educators across most of the United States were forced to adapt their curriculum to remote learning. Educators also had little time to figure out how to teach to a computer screen and keep everyone engaged. Despite the expected ups and downs, it was a pleasant surprise at how well everyone adapted. It is truly amazing how quickly everyone settled into things and how technology platforms like Zoom helped to make things easier. We have always believed that technology played an essential role in education. Now, our experience with e-learning confirmed this even more.

NEW GRADING PROTOCOL For Covid-19


GRADES ARE TYPICALLY CALCULATED AS FOLLOWS: 40% QUARTER 3 40% QUARTER 4 20% SEMESTER EXAM

THIS SEMESTER WE HAVE CHANGED TO: 67% QUARTER 3 33% QUARTER 4

Cumulative exams are not mandatory for all courses; however, some teachers have opted to give them, in which case the exams will be calculated as part of the 4th quarter grade.

Students will be given an option to appeal their semester grades should they fall two or more steps lower than their quarter 3 grade.

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Here is what some of our teachers had to say about their experiences with e-learning:

"I was really impressed with the ability of the teachers & students to quickly adapt to a whole new format for learning. Students remained engaged with learning the curriculum needed for future success in their chosen path. Learning new content is never easy and everyone made the best of the situation!"

"My teaching changed significantly during the stay-at-home. Early on, I decided that this unprecedented situation would change my expectations of my students. While I still expected assignments to be completed and videos to be watched, I allowed students more flexibility. Instead of having daily videos, I opted to share teaching videos twice a week so students could have time to watch them and take notes. I did not require them to log on and be "live" for these videos. My pre-recorded videos could be accessed anywhere with internet, and did not need to be downloaded to be viewed. Also, I gave more time than usual to complete assignments and tests. All of these changes had the goal of easing stress so that students would not feel pinched for time. While we did not cover the same amount of information as we would have in class, I am pleased with our pace during the time of e-learning."

"My favorite and most valuable thing I did was to simply ask students to write about how they were doing spiritually, emotionally, physically, and mentally. I shared my own experience with them just to show that it is okay to struggle and it is okay to have good days. It was very eye opening to hear what they had to say about this crazy time. Many had struggled at the beginning but then had sweet stories of extra time spent with siblings home from college or board games every night with their parents—time and memories that they would not have had without this new normal. It was nice to see them look at this from a mature and positive standpoint."
